In the spring of 1922 a group of young women organized the Wednest literary club, the third oldest literary club in the city. At about that same time the Thomas Hackney Braswell Memorial Libra-ry. was dedicated (in October, 1923) as a gift to the city from the late Dr. Mark R. Braswell, in

memory of his son.
The young women were helped immeasurably in their literary program planning and preparation by the librarian, Mrs. Nell G. Battle, and last Wednesday the club members honored Mrs. Battle in appreciation for her assistance to them, and her contribution to the com-munity in her capacity as librari-an by presenting a portrait of her to the Braswell Memorial

Library.
